Summary of School of Nursing Curriculum Changes

These items are presented to CoHS curriculum and CAPC as informational items only. The School of Nursing completed a two year intensive review of the Bachelor of Science curriculum which culminated in the following recommended changes which have been approved by the Georgia College Nursing Faculty Organization. This review process is part of the guidelines outlined by Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) and the School of Nursing's Educational Effectiveness Plan. This comprehensive review was undertaken with the following assumptions:

1.) Georgia College School of Nursing has an excellent reputation and historically as excellent 1st time pass rate on the NCLEX Licensure exam. Georgia College had the highest 1st time pass rate on the licensure exam in the state in 2016.

2.) As a School of Nursing housed in Georgia's Public Liberal Arts University; this mission should be clearly reflected in our curriculum and in our program outcomes.

Overarching Purpose of the Review:

Specific Aim One: To ensure that program outcomes in the Bachelor of Science curriculum are congruent with the guidelines set forth by National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Essentials of Baccalaureate Practice (AACN), and Quality and Safety Education for Nurses (QSEN) Competencies. All content and program outcomes are mapped to these guidelines.

Specific Aim Two: To ensure that program outcomes in the Bachelor of Science Curriculum are congruent with the Georgia College liberal arts mission.

Specific Aim Three: To collaborate with School of Nursing stakeholders (faculty, students, and community partners) to identify areas for improvement that will ensure that students graduate with the skills required to be safe beginning practitioners who also enjoy the added benefits afforded by a liberal arts education.

Review Process:

- Faculty were surveyed using online questionnaires and also in forum discussions.

- Students were surveyed using online questionnaires and also in forum discussions.
- Stakeholders were surveyed using online questionnaires and also in forum discussions.

Compilation of data from all stakeholders was shared at Nursing Faculty Organization meetings (NFO) and with the Nursing Advisory Board. Curriculum review and revisions were planned and completed during three Curriculum Development Days which were held during 2016 and 2017.

Recommendations:

Tables 1 -3 documents the approved changes brought forward from the School of Nursing Curriculum Committee and adopted by the Nursing Faculty Organization in May 2017. Total **credit hours (60)** and total **lab hours (24 credit and 780 contact)** for the program are **unchanged**. Program outcomes were revised to reflect current generalist beginning practitioner guidelines and Georgia College Liberal Arts Mission. Course names were changed for **seven courses** to more accurately reflect content and alignment with program outcomes. **Two new courses** was also approved that combines two previous courses. **Four courses were discontinued** primarily because of courses being combined or new courses that better reflect the program outcomes. A series of **four no credit seminars** were added to infuse liberal arts content over the two year nursing program. These seminars will be heavily influenced by current issues and real world situations. A copy of both the current program of study and the proposed program of study are included for your review. Additionally a comprehensive teach out plan is provided for student who are currently in the program.

Program of Study (calculated credit hour methodology)

Class hours are calculated by multiplying 5 X 15 because classroom credit is awarded on a 1 to 1 ratio. 1 hour of contact = 1 hour of credit.

Lab hours are calculated by using the approved ratio of 1 credit hour = 2 contact hours for undergraduate. So for every 1 hour of credit the student spends 2 hours in lab. For example, you would multiple 4 x 15 x 2 to = 120 for our NRSG 3245 course.

Clinical MSN Ratio is 1 credit hour = 3 contact hours

Clinical DNP Ratio is 1 credit hour = 4 contact hours

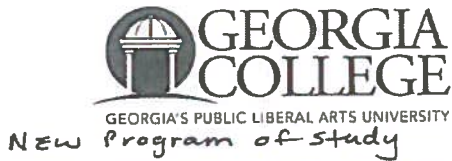
