D. Course summary: discuss issues impacting the course, results of changes made the previous semester (did they work?), and plans for the next offering of the course that are not mentioned in the table above.

No major changes are currently needed at this time. We have brought back the hard copy of the text book as an option only for the class this year as part of the reduced cost initiatives. This was driven by my want for more updated guidelines and treatment plans and the poor results of Sherpath. Discussion of officially hybridizing course continues being discussed with all faculty involved at this time. More links, case studies, patient reviews and other content is online, but will still have face-to face classes every week. HESI adaptive quizzing has been discontinued, but we continue increasing the number case studies and patient reviews are being utilized in the course. Instructors will continue to evaluate the course for its ongoing effectiveness and address any necessary changes as needed. Suggestions to clinical changes included more acute care rotations within the Children's Hospital has been addressed and students are now rotating to CH twice, once on Tuesday and one more day shift on Saturday. We continue to work with our community partners for service learning with the vision & hearing, scoliosis and teaching sessions within Baldwin and surrounding county schools. We have implemented a multi-patient simulation that continues to get great feedback. We will continue to monitor for further improvements we can make improvements the course/content/clinical experiences. New ideas are being discussed with all course faculty for future plans to implement in Fall 2018/19. However, this course is merging with OB/Women's Health course and it will becoming Nursing the Family so this course will no longer be continued after this year. More discussion regarding changes that will take place over the summer and beginning of 19/20 academic year and how the new merged course will evolve continue to be worked on within the nursing department and specific subcommittee's member's work.
