D. Course summary: discuss issues impacting the course, results of changes made the previous semester (did they work?), and plans for the next offering of the course that are not mentioned in the table above.

- a. Finding clinical space is becoming challenging and time consuming. Requests are sent at least one semester prior to the practicum experience but not secured until approximately 3 weeks after the semester begins.
- b. Clinical facilities are unable to provide placements for all of our students and report that the number of clinical hours required is problematic.
- c. The following problems were identified in student evaluations
 - i. Fall 2017
 - 1. Journaling was overwhelming and unnecessary
 - 2. Fewer hours would be sufficient
 - 3. Discuss the EBP project early in the semester
 - ii. Spring 2018
 - 1. Multiple complaints of “late clinical starts.” Students continue to verbalize a desire to start clinicals earlier (fall 2017 assignments were released on 9/11 and the first students began clinical on 9/14; spring semester clinical assignments were released 2/12 and the first student began clinical on 2/13.)
 - 2. “Simulation should not go away.”
 - 3. Allow use of specialty sites for practicum rather than just medical surgical.
